This group of Seabees and their hive of "Can Do" volunteers hold working party Wednesdays to upgrade, operate, and maintain the SMMP grounds, including the renovation of the Chapel in the Pines, creation of all of the museum displays, and providing tours colorful stories for the museum visitors.

This year was a bonus as well, as MCB1 held their Reunion/Swarm concurrently with the Seabee Celebration, and three World War II Seabees were also in attendance. It was a great night, and no amount of rain could stop these Seabees from the task at hand.

The SMSA, represented by Lou Cariello, the Chairman of the Board, presented three awards, starting with the Can-Do Award, which is given to a corporation, foundation, or organization for embodying the Seabee "CAN DO" Spirit through its generous support of the SMSA Scholarship program. This award has been previously presented to AECOM, Parsons, Huntington Ingalls,

Clark Construction, ECC and Turner Construction. This year's award is presented to the Francis T. & Louise T. Nichols Foundation.

The Francis T. & Louise T. Nichols Foundation has supported the SMSA since 2010. Over the years they have contributed over \$250,000 to support scholarships for students in the Northeast. Francis and Louise Nichols were the parents of EOC William Thayer Nichols who served as a Seabee in the Naval Reserve, completing 27 years of service before retiring in 1994. Chief Nichols received a Navy Achievement Medal in 1988 and was awarded Seabee of the Year for Reserve Naval Construction Regiment 27. He was always very proud of the Seabees and the work they did and was instrumental in the Foundation supporting the Scholarship Program. A member of the Nichols family had planned to attend but was unable to come at the last minute.

The next award is presented to one of SMSA's distinguished scholars, a

graduate who has done great things in their chosen field and represents the "Can Do" values of the Seabees. The 2023 SMSA Distinguished Scholar is Courtney Santos.

Courtney received a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a master's degree in moderate disabilities from Bridgewater State University as well as a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies in Autism Spectrum Disorders from Arizona State University. She is in her fifth year as a Special Education Teacher at the elementary level. Courtney says, "Teaching is my passion, watching my students learn and grow brings me great joy."

Courtney's Seabee Sponsor is CM3 Tom Santos, SMMP Vice President and SHF Board of Trustees.

The final SMSA award The SMSA Everyday Hero Award is presented to a Seabee that has proven performance above and beyond and has had a significant impact- on or off duty.

The 2023 Award goes to SW1 Cayla N. George from NAVFAC EURAFCENT PWD Sigonella, Italy. The citation from her nomination reads: SW1 Cayla N. George is awarded the SMSA Everyday Hero Award for exhibiting outstanding moral courage in support of the traditions and legacy of the Seabees while serving public works department Sigonella, Italy. On 11 February 2023, Petty Officer demonstrated exceptional gallantry when she instantly sprang into action after receiving a call from an unknown number about a possible suicide attempt in the barracks. She immediately called emergency services and directed sailors closest to the service member's room to provide immediate support, ultimately saving the sailor's life. Her unrelenting perseverance, and steadfast

devotion to duty reflected great credit on her and contributed significantly to perpetuating the Seabee legacy.

The SHF, represented by Kevin Slates, the Chairman of the Board, presented three awards, starting with the award named in honor of the SHF's longest serving Chairman, Rear Admiral Ben Montoya. The Montoya Award is given to an individual or a company who has been a generous long-term supporter of the Foundation to help preserve our Seabee history and legacy. This year's award winner is Rear Admiral Robert (Bob) M. Gallen.

The this year's award goes to CM1 Rodney H. Paris from Naval Special Warfare Group ONE.

Some highlights from CM1 nomination read, "While serving as logistics department Leading Officer for SEAL Team 5 from Oct 2022 2023, CM1 Paris Sep extraordinary contributions to mission operations, critical life support, and sustainment of special operations camps in support of missions in the Arabian Peninsula. He led 10 sailors and 12 DoD contracted personnel in the planning and execution of 36 camp sustainment and infrastructure upgrade projects valued at \$3.8 million.

Examples of those projects were: the

installation of a hardened ammunition supply point and fueling supply point; the construction of two 1,600 square foot maintenance facilities; perimeter lighting, security gates, and a 30-foot tower to counter unmanned aerial systems. His efforts greatly improved the security of and response time for forward deployed forces. He also led the embarkation retrograde for 70 flights when the Team redeployed.

CM1 Paris' impressive accomplishments, perseverance, and steadfast devotion to duty reflected great credit on himself and contributed significantly to perpetuating the Seabee legacy.

Each year, the SHF awards the RADM Lewis B. Combs Award which is presented to the individual who has made the most outstanding contribution in perpetuating the legacy of the Seabees and the Civil Engineer Corps.

An officer of exceptional ingenuity and determination, LT Price led over 150 Seabees in the largest prototype training program where the entire company trained in all aspects airfield damage repair, port damage repair, ground lines of communication construction, bridging, and advanced base construction.

He and his company tested this combined construct during Exercise Turning Point where NMCB 4 conducted distributed operations at five different sites across southern California.

the 2022 **INDOPACOM** During deployment he led a detail of 39 Sailors and 11 Marines delivering \$4m worth of infrastructure upgrades improving Pacific Fleet's sustainment second posture within the island chain. LT Price's impressive bold leadership, performance, professional achievement reflected great credit upon himself and contributed significantly to the enduring legacy of the Seabees and the Civil Engineer Corps.


News from the Quarterly Board Meetings

Good Samaritan suffered burns pulling truck driver from fiery wreck

A hero who helped pull a driver from a fiery wreck in Northern Virginia last week says instinct kicked in when he rushed to the burning truck.

The semitrailer was clipped by a car in the southbound lanes of Route 28. It flipped over and exploded into flames.

"While it was rolling, it was already on fire," Mark Pembleton said. "Then it rolled to a stop, and I immediately pulled over with my kids, told them to stay in the car."

As the flames grew – and with his children watching - Pembleton knew he needed to act fast. After calling 911 he headed toward the flames.

"As soon as I came around the truck on fire, I could hear him yelling, 'Help, help, help!" Pembleton said.

The truck driver, Cesar Yepez, was engulfed in flames.

Pembleton began to meticulously pull Yepez out of the truck.

"At certain points it, was so hot, the fire was just so much that I'd run in and grab him, I'd pull him back inches," Pembleton said. "It was just a systematic, you know, getting inches and inches and inches."



Soon, other bystanders helped, and eventually they rescued Emergency crews took him to a hospital where he remains gravely injured.

For Pembleton, there was no time for fear. His 20-plus years in the Navy kicked in to save a fellow father.

"He was saying, 'I have kids. I have kids. Please help me," Pembleton said. "I have to get him out of there. If he was fighting, I was fighting."

Yepez's family said he's a loving husband and father of two young children.

A statement sent on behalf of the family reads in part, "The Yepez-Casucci family

> is extremely thankful for the love support Unfortunately, there will not be an ending to this story until Cesar has made a full recovery and is back home with his family. Thank you for your continued prayer and support."

The family has set up an online fundraiser to help with medical expenses.

Pembleton, who suffered second- and third-degree burns, met the family in the hospital and said he will continue to do what he can to support them.

"Hoping, praying, everything for them, for Cesar to get better," he said.

He said he's dealing with pain but has returned to work.

Mark has a fairly long road to recovery with the extent of his injuries, but selflessly asked to share the GoFunfMe for the truck driver, Cesar, who is alive, but fighting for his life on a ventilator in critical condition. Once a Brawner, 'Always a Brawner'

Brawner Elementary School celebrates return of Officer Fowler

Brawner Elementary School Security Officer Steven Fowler may have spent the past year giving back and serving his country in Africa — but the call of duty had nothing on the pride and joy he felt coming back to a school that means the world to him.

Last fall, the Navy Seabee traveled abroad to Djibouti Africa on a military assignment, where he was tasked with loading cargo such as vehicles, uniforms, and medical supplies onto large planes.

"While I was there, I got to go on a couple helicopter rides," Fowler said, during Brawner's school assembly on Sept. 15. "I got to do a couple snorkeling trips and got to go out of town and do coalitions to take stuff to other bases. I can't talk too much about what I did, though because I just signed a letter confidentiality."

After being gone just shy of a full year, Fowler officially returned Brawner to Monday, Sept. 11 — and he couldn't have been happier.

"I'm enjoying being back. I miss being here," Fowler told the HCN on Sept. 15. "I love this job, just the kids make it great, so being gone that year

it was kind of depressing being away from all of them, but they did write me letters, so I enjoyed that, and I got to hang up pictures that they had sent."

Before he left last year, the school presented Fowler with Granbury Independent District "G" School flag containing signatures from around 900 students. Once he arrived in Africa, he proudly displayed the flag on his wall so he could always remember where he came from.

During Fowler's "Welcome Home" ceremony, he also presented students and faculty with a couple of plaques that he designed himself in Africa using a woodworking program.

"The plaque is the shape of Africa, and it has my name and 'Brawner' presented on it," Fowler explained to the HCN. "The coin is command coin that we had made over there, (and it also

"We're gonna hang this in a really special place so that all of you (students) can see this every single day," Brawner Elementary School Principal Sandy Ruiz said during the ceremony. "Thank you, Officer Fowler. We're so glad you're back."

While Fowler was gone completing his military duties, Officer Chris Burke stepped in as his replacement.

"For the last almost year, when Fowler left for deployment, we had somebody step up in a really, really big way," Brawner Assistant Principal Julie Sellers, said during the ceremony. "Officer Burke came in and served at Brawner. He has a very calm, very serious presence. That's something that I love about him. As a matter of fact, one of the first things I asked him was 'Hey Burke, were you ever a police officer in the military or something?' and he's like, 'No,' and I was like, 'You carry yourself like 'I mean business." But at the same time, Officer Burke has taken the time to get to know the teachers, get to know our staff, and get to know each and every one of you. And I think it's so very special when we have an officer that takes the time to do that."

As Fowler leaves his African Seabee duties behind, he will resume his duties as a security officer at a school that has always held a special place in his heart.

"This was actually my middle school 20 years ago," Fowler had previously told the HCN before he left on his deployment. "I was the last eighth grade class who went through when it was Meadows Middle School."

The 37-year-old Seabee only has a year-and -a-half left in the Navy before he retires, but he said he is glad that Africa was his last deployment, so he never has to leave Brawner again.

"I didn't really want to leave, but I enjoyed it," he said. "I won't ever have to actually leave again unless something bad happens — which fingers crossed nothing does — but I'm looking forward to not having to leave anymore."

Ruiz added that "it feels amazing" to have Fowler back at Brawner.

"We're going to truly miss Officer Burke, but having Fowler back, it feels like our whole family is back together again," she said.

Fowler added that he plans to stay at Brawner until he retires at the age of 65.

"If I can stay here until I retire from the school district, I'll be happy," he added. "So long as they'll let me, I'll keep coming."

Navy proves superior at annual Joint Service Truck Rodeo

FORT LEONARD WOOD. Mo. — Imagine backing up a vehicle through a winding serpentine of cones with precision-perfect accuracy now, try it in a 35,000-pound 18-wheeler. That is just one of the challenges 16 competitors had to negotiate during the Transportation 58th Battalion's 8th Annual Joint Service Truck Rodeo Friday at Training Area 228.

Each service that teaches motor transport operators on post — Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines — send four instructors to represent their branch. According to organizers, the competition is designed to showcase the instructors' technical expertise

behind the wheel through friendly competition.

This year's winning team, earning the title of "Victors of the Road," came from the Navy's Center for Seabees and Facilities Engineering Detachment Fort Leonard Wood — Petty Officers 1st Class Daniel Morris, Jeff Reaves and Michael Swan, and Petty Officer 2nd Class Justin Sobieralski.

"Congratulations to the Navy on their win. They earned it," said Sgt. 1st Class Ernest Haefner, this year's transporter awarded for having the most individual points.

Haefner is an instructor for the Transportation 58th Battalion's Motor Transport Operator Course, where he teaches new Soldiers the military specialty of

Transport Operator. He has been driving professionally for 23 years.

"I was a commercial driver seven years before the Army and have been an 88M for over 16 years," Haefner said.

Sgt. 1st Class Michael Kovac, one of this year's event organizers, is also instructor at the U.S. Army Transportation School's MTOC. He said each branch designs an event based off their own instruction — his favorite event to watch this year was the Air Force's forward drive and reverse serpentine challenge in a sleeper cab tractor trailer.

"It looks easy driving forward but taking that trailer in reverse is like trying to take a grocery store cart backwards through cones. If you want to go left, you have to push the back end to the right," Kovac said. "It is a tricky event."

The Navy's challenge included parallel parking a

Medium MK31 **Tactical** Vehicle Replacement tractor trailer. The Army's challenge was to back a M915 tractor trailer through a 90-degree turn. The Marines set up a



question mark-shaped alley which competitors through had to back a Medium Tactical Vehicle Replacement with a MK593 cargo trailer.

The teams took turns rotating through the events, meaning the drivers had to show proficiency in operating other branch's vehicles.

service's vehicle adds a level of difficulty because the maneuver has to be executed in a vehicle they are unfamiliar with," Kovac said. "These instructors have to be able to take their skills and efficiently apply them to any vehicle in any situation."

Haefner said learning about other vehicles, "is a rare opportunity — an excellent opportunity for everyone."

According to Kovac, competitions like this are important because they build joint-service relationships.

"We have to be able to speak each other's lingo. If we build these relationships now, it will make missions we will face in the future more successful. When we are working together on the battlefield, we will already have that bond and it won't be like we are speaking foreign languages," Kovac said. "At the end of the day, we all joined the military for the same reasons — to protect our country and better ourselves. We just took different paths. We are one family."

Haefner said instructors thinking about competing in the truck rodeo next year should take the unique opportunity.

"This event enables you to be a multi-platform, multi-functional operator. The team comradery among the squads made it all worth it. This opportunity has only been available to me while serving at Fort Leonard Wood."


