# Scholarship Season is Open -- Help Spread the Word!

Did you know the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA) awarded 161 scholarships valued at \$497,000 in 2022? SMSA scholarships are open to children and grandchildren of Seabees and Civil Engineer Corps officers, as well as who have served in the Naval Construction Force. So, if you've served with the Seabees in any capacity, your child and/or grandchild are eligible to apply.

Our challenge now is letting people know about the scholarship. You'd be surprise how many are unaware that we have money to help these young people achieve their educational dreams.

"I encourage everyone to let others know about the Seabee Memorial scholarship -not just graduating seniors, but also those who are currently in college. If the student has a Seabee connection, they're eligible to apply," says Percy Trent, Force Master Chief of the Seabees (Retired).

Scholarships are awarded for accredited fouryear bachelor's degrees, two-year associates degrees or Career & Technical Education (CTE) degrees (12-18 month career and technical education programs). We do not provide scholarships for graduate school, part-time programs or great-grandchildren.

Scholarship selections are made on the basis of leadership, good citizenship, character, financial need, and scholastic record. Scholarship awards may be used for tuition, books and academic-related fees. Scholarships are renewable for up to four-


years provided recipient meets academic requirements.



A Seabee's Story: In a Heartbeat!

CMH-3, U.S. Navy Seabees, 1966-1970

n August of 1966 I received my draft notice. Two years before, I'd considered joining the military right out of high school, and I took the Air Force exam. I scored well on it and wanted to join an Airborne unit, but failed the physical because of a badly infected ingrown toenail. So, that was not meant to be. My dad's best friend was a Seabee in WWII, and one of my good friends was in the Seabee reserves in my hometown of St. Louis, MO. He encouraged me to join the Seabees, so I went and spoke to the Navy recruiter who told me there were no openings. I walked out and thankfully he stopped me and had me come back the next day. After a bit of bartering with him, I got my wish and became a Seabee. I took the 120-day delayed entry program they were offering at the time and went on active duty on December 29, 1966.

After boot camp at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center, my first duty station was Port Hueneme, Ca. Several months of messing around in the regiment, prompted me to volunteer to go T.A.D. to Midway Island. When I returned in the spring of 1968, I was given orders to NMCB 3 and attended heavy equipment mechanic 'A' school. Our battalion was then, subsequently sent to Danang, Vietnam in June of 1968, where I worked in the heavy equipment mechanic shop until I was sent on detachment to NMCB 133, which was deployed to Camp Campbell in Phu Bai, I worked the midnight shift in the mechanic shop for a few months. Upon returning from Phu Bai, a large portion of our battalion was then sent on detachment to the An Hoa combat base, where we would replace the airstrip matting with an upgraded matting. Supposedly, the project




would take us a few weeks, it was completed in less than a week. However, I stayed down there for over a month. While in Phu Bai, our battalion transferred camps leaving Camp Faulkner and reestablishing at Camp Haskins, South, at Red Beach, that's where we spent TET of 1969, a mere shadow of the TET of 68. But still not any fun.

Our tour ended in March of 1969, and we were welcomed home at Point Mugu by President Nixon and his wife Pat. It was a 'photo op' for the president and an extra few hours of duty time for a bunch of guys who had sat on a plane for close to 24 hours and wanted to go home on leave.

Six months later, near the end of August of 1969, our advanced party had already left







for Vietnam, where we'd spend another tour in Danang. However, President Nixon escalated his plan of troop withdrawal, and we were reassigned and went to Okinawa instead. The battalion was on military stand-by just in case the war re-escalated and they needed us back. I spent the next six months on Okinawa and a short T.A.D. assignment to Guam and then was offered an early out, which I took.

Upon discharge, I went to St. Louis University, on the G. I. Bill, where I received a degree focusing in geology and geography. I decided my senior year I'd go to the St. Louis College of Pharmacy, which I did for awhile, but ended up going back (LEFT) - Gene Giunta, pictured in 2020, describes himself as a "Proud, old Seabee veteran."

to finish my degree at St. Louis U. After that, I went to graduate school to work on getting an MBA at Southern Illinois University. I married Brenda during my second year of undergraduate school, and by 1977, both our children Alyce and Zach were part of the family.

My career, because of my experience in pharmacy, segued me into the medical field, where I worked as a hospital purchasing manager, a materials manager, and then as the home health care field grew, as a district and a regional manager for infusion therapy and durable medical equipment companies, as well as later on, owning my own healthcare consulting firm and home healthcare business.

In 1998, President Clinton enacted changes to the home health portion of Medicare, and those changes directly impacted the revenues of our consulting business. The consulting work was our primary source of revenue. So at year end, my business partner and I closed both our home health and consulting businesses. At that point in time my wife decided she wanted to become a flight attendant and secured a job as one with American Airlines, in Boston, Ma. We decided to sell our house in Missouri and we moved to Boston, where I took a job with American Airlines as well. I retired from American Airlines in 2012, where I worked in material logistics and moved to Tilton, New Hampshire where we lived for three years. In 2015, we moved back to a three acre piece of property in Lincoln County, Missouri, where we presently live.

The Seabees did something for me that I cherish to this day, it gave me direction, discipline, respect, it helped build a sense of self-worth in me, it taught me how to manage people, and most importantly, it helped me mature in a positive way. Before going into the service I had little interests other than driving my souped up car and having a good time. I was a terrible student in high school as well as college, where I dropped out twice. The Seabees gave me the tools to succeed, providing me with an excellent environment to work in, a chance for promotion, and a true sense of stability. Granted, my time in Vietnam was no picnic, and there are things about that experience that I still deal with to this day, nevertheless, that time in the Seabees helped mold me into the man that I am now. Without that experience I'm not sure where I would have ended up.

Would I join the Seabees again if I had to do it all over? That's a simple answer, of course, *I'd do it in a heartbeat*.

Our Seabees have

been busy bees across the entire Pacific. I'm Commander of Naval Construction Group 1 (NCG 1) and I could not be more proud of the work our Seabees are doing each and every day. NCG 1 active units include the 30th Naval Construction Regiment (NCR) in Guam, Naval Mobile Construction Battalions (NMCBs) 3, 4, 5, and Underwater Construction Team 2 in Port Hueneme 2, and Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit (CBMU) 303 in San Diego with a detachment in Hawaii. The main body deployment site for our active NMCBs is Camp Shields in Okinawa, Japan. Our reserve units include the 1st NCR and NMCBs 18, 22, and 25 which are all homeported in Port Hueneme.

Our Pacific Seabees have been very busy conducting engineering and construction operations in Japan, Diego Garcia,

NMCB 18 will take over the mission recently completed by our east coast reserve Seabees and very recently deployed detachments to Bahrain in support of ongoing CENTCOM tasking as well as other locations in Africa.

Not a day goes by that I am not amazed with the hard work, dedication, and accomplishments of our Seabees. I know without question that a source of this excellence comes from standing on the shoulders of those that came before us. Thank you to all Seabees past and present!

#### Happy 81st Birthday, Seabees! Naval Construction

Group 2 (NCG 2), which was once the 20th Naval Construction Regiment and then the 20th Seabee Readiness Group is as active as ever as we near the 81st Birthday of the Seabees and 156th birthday of the Civil Engineer Corps.

NCG 2 units in Gulfport, Mississippi include the active units 22nd Naval Construction Regiment (NCR) and Naval Mobile Construction Battalions (NMCBs) 1, 11 and 133 as well as the reserve 7th NCR and NMCBs 14 and 27. We also have Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit (CBMU) 202 and Underwater Construction Team 1 in Little Creek, VA as well as a CBMU 202 detachment in Jacksonville, FL.

In addition to the NMCB main body site at Camp Mitchell in Rota, Spain, NCG 2 has Seabee detachments in Romania, Georgia (the country, not the state), Norway, Italy, Cyprus, Morocco, Tunisia and Ghana, providing construction support on the cutting edge of Great Power Competition. NMCBs 14 and 27 have both recently deployed detachments to Bahrain in support of ongoing CENTCOM tasking as well as other locations in Africa. We also keep a foothold in the Pacific, with a large detachment deployed to Camp Covington, Guam.

Prior to taking command of NCG 2, I worked at the Indo-Pacific Command, directing operations of Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine engineers throughout the Pacific. While I appreciated my joint brothers and sister engineers equally, when I needed them, the only force trained and equipped, and with the expeditionary "CAN DO" mindset to perform the toughest jobs, were U.S. Navy Seabees. They never failed me.

At NCG 2, I'm proud to serve with the world's finest military engineers. Seabee veterans paved the way for the force we have today, and you have set the standard we always try to live up to. Hoorah!

JEREZ DE LA FRONTERA, Spain – U.S. Navy Seabees deployed to Naval Station Rota volunteered at a historic Carthusian Monastery in Jerez de la Frontera, Spain, for a community service opportunity, January 22.

More than 20 Sailors from Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 11, stationed at nearby Naval Station Rota, volunteered at the Charterhouse of Santa María de la Defensión in Jerez de La Frontera, where they assisted local nuns in the upkeep of the 16th-century Spanish historical monument.

"The Seabee 'Can Do' spirit was evident as our volunteers pulled weeds and hauled debris... just for the satisfaction of

debris... just for the satisfaction of helping others," said Lt. Ken Slaughter, NMCB 11's chaplain. "Their selfless service is truly inspiring."

The volunteers transported and chopped large quantities of firewood for burning in the monastery's furnace. Additionally, they cleared debris and dug ditches for planting trees.

"Every American that has come here, especially the military personnel, has been a great help to us because they are strong, they have energy and they know how to work and they finish what they start," said Sister Crist-Hallel, a nun at the Charterhouse.

"The monastery is a beautiful place and you can work outdoors, enjoying the

> sun, enjoying each other's company. All this makes this a good volunteer opportunity."

The Charterhouse of Santa María de la Defensión began construction in the 16th century, and since then had been worked on by Spanish Baroque architects, woodworkers and painters until its establishment as one Spanish National a Monument in 1856.

NMCB 11 operates as a part of Navy

Expeditionary Combat Command and is assigned to Commander, Task Force (CTF) 68 for deployment across the U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa area of operations to defend U.S., allied, and partner interests. NMCB 11 is currently deployed to Naval Station (NAVSTA) Rota in support of CTF 68.

NAVSTA Rota sustains the fleet, enables the fighter operations, port operations, ensuring security and safety, assuring quality of life and providing the core services of power, fuel and information technology.

### The Mike and Marie Marschall Scholarship

The Mike and Marie Marschall Seabee Scholarship was established by their children to further the studies of civil engineer candidates who are children or grandchildren of current or former Seabees.

RADM A.R. ("Mike") Marschall served 35 years in the U.S. Navy, including a tour of duty in the South Pacific during World War II and two billets in Vietnam, before eventually becoming Chief of Civil Engineers. Reflecting on the time spent as chief, he stated that his single greatest point of pride was that he knew the names of not only everyone who worked for him, but of their spouses and kids as well. In the eyes of our parents, the Seabees were extended family. They represented the standard to which our dad held all other associations; no entity within the private sector was ever able to measure up to the pride, commitment, and integrity of this "august group."



According to the Marschall's children, "The scholarship honors and perpetuates that larger sense of esprit de corps, and our parents considered it a great honor to have been associated with the Seabees. Being able to nurture the education of these worthy scholarship candidates as they become members of the Seabee family would mean the world to Mike and Marie."



### The SW3 Eric L. Knott Scholarship

The SW3 Eric Knott scholarship was funded by the Washington DC Seabee DC Golf Tournament. SW3 Knott was killed in action on September 4th, 2004. According to his family, "Eric had a big heart and accepted people for who they were. He enjoyed

singing in the high school show choir and helping build sets for the school's musicals. His racing career started with Hot Wheels on the driveway to working on race cars where he and his siblings won pit crew of the year. Then he went on to racing the sprint car at a county fair which was a big highlight for him. He also was a very proud owner of his Camaro. Whether it was neighbors, teachers, classmates that needed help, Eric was there. His goal in life was to make people smile and he is still doing that with this scholarship."
