'It's about the camaraderie': Seabee vets form Myrtle Beach area chapter

Here's a little know fact for locals. You're living on SC Island X-3.

When the Navy Seabees wrote home during World War II, their location was top -secret. No matter where they deployed, members of the Navy's Construction Battalions — CBs, hence Seabees — referred to their whereabouts as "Island X."

Ever since, the Navy Seabee Veterans of America designate their individual chapters as "islands," and now the Myrtle Beach area has an island of its own — SC Island X-3. It was chartered as a nonprofit

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organization several months ago, with the ultimate aim of putting members' engineering and construction skills to work for the community.

The local island, just the third in South Carolina, was formed by Eric Treece of Myrtle Beach, a secondgeneration Seabee. His father, a career utility man, served in the Gulf War. Eric Treece was a heavy equipment mechanic, and retired in 2011 after serving 20 years.

So far, the group has functioned more as an alumni association than a construction outfit. Treece has organized about a dozen Seabee "swarms" essentially meet and greets where Seabees gather to tell war stories, and make new friends.

The first swarm he scheduled, nobody showed. "I was a little bummed," Treece recalled.

But he showed that "can do" spirit that is the Seabees' motto, and scheduled another. Word spread, and Seabee vets showed up from across the Carolinas. One guy drove five hours to attend.

"That's how passionate we are about connecting with our Seabee brothers and sisters. It's about the camaraderie," Treece said.

Now, the monthly swarms draw dozens to American Legion Post 40 in Socastee from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on the

second Saturday of each month. Treece's wife, Veronica, is starting an Auxiliary unit, and donating a portion of sales from her mobile, patriotic boutique to the effort. And the fighting construction workers of Island X-3 are ready to roll up their sleeves, and offer their services.

Before each swarm there's a morning meeting of the core group of local Island leaders. It's where they decided to incorporate this fall, and where they're making plans to take on some projects.

Treece said Seabee units are set up like construction companies with electricians, plumbers, surveyors, welders, builders, equipment operators and heavy-equipment mechanics. They were formed in World War II to build the infrastructure that enabled U.S. Marines to advance. The only difference between a construction battalion and a company construction is Seabees are trained to fight. So Island X-3 can handle anything from repairing a porch and replacing a roof to airstrip building an or fighting off enemy combatants.

Treece said the Island is now forming teams to tackle specific kinds of projects based on members' areas of expertise. And they're networking with area groups and agencies to determine who, what, when and where to help. They already know why.

"Service to God and country; that's the foundation we base everything on," Treece said. "With that spirit of 'can-do,' I think we're going to have a big impact in our community." Bee News

A Seabee's Story: Pat Hogan

"When I graduated from high school in 1972. I had no prospects of a decent job and no opportunity for college. My dad had served in the Army in the Philippines and then Occupied Germany during/after WW2. My oldest brother had served in the Navy in the early 60's. The military sounded like a great option for me.

I enlisted in the Navy via the 180-day delay program in 1972. After enlisting I was given the ASVAB test. I scored well in mechanical aptitude. My recruiter was EOC Francis White. He asked me if I liked trucks and heavy equipment, I said yes and that's how I became a Seabee. A Seabee created another Seabee.

I entered the delay program on April 28, 1972 I entered active duty on September 9, 1972. I left active duty on September 3, 1976, and I was discharged from the inactive reserve on April 28, 1978."

Pat attended boot camp at





Naval Training Center, San Diego and attended Equipment Operator A-School at Construction Battalion Center, Port Hueneme, CA.

His first duty station was at Naval Magazine, Guam, Marianas Islands during the last years of the Vietnam Here, he handled War. ammunition, mostly bombs Wharf from Hotel to Anderson Air Force Base or to the Magazine for storage. Other duties included working for public works and cutting fire trails through the jungle and being appointed to work as the special services person on the small base, he scheduled USO shows and ordered movies for the outdoor theater.

Pat then transferred to Naval Air Station/National Parachute Test Range, El Centro, California, and worked public works and infrastructure construction, sweeping runways, streets, etc. El Centro was the winter headquarters for the Blue Angels, so the Seabees provided the transportation services for the pilots and support crew. He also drove the base church bus on Sundays.



His follow-on orders brought him to Port Hueneme and NMCB "Fighting 40," where he deployed to Naval Station, Roosevelt Roads, Ceiba, Puerto Rico. While deployed, they completed public works projects on the base including building enlisted new barracks and demolishing old structures. EOCN Hogan drove the battalion taxi during most of the deployment, in addition to working in the gravel pit and the tire shop. He rotated back to Port Hueneme early due to the end of his enlistment. He met all the requirements for advancement to EO3, but his time was up and he was honorably discharged prior to putting it on.

Pat drove truck and many other jobs after returning to civilian life and ultimately settled on work in the restaurant business where he retired as a restaurant manager and head cook.

In appreciation for his time in service and understanding the sacrifices our service members endure in the defense of our country, Pat has been volunteering the last 2-1/2 years with the American Legion Post 76 in Arlington, Washington to put care packages together for service members serving overseas. This has been a bonding moment he has shared with is 5-year old granddaughter, Bailey, who decorates and packs the boxes. Her favorite part is getting pictures back from our troops holding up boxes that she decorated. Packing day is definitely her favorite day of the month, where they pack an average of 30 boxes a month, and (Continued on page 6)

sometimes up to 60 boxes. As of their last packing day, they have shipped 1,023 boxes for troops. All items in the boxes and costs for shipping are made possible through public donations.

Now in retirement, Pat enjoys working on and showing his 1964 Plymouth Barracuda hot rod. His main hobby is metal detecting all over the Pacific Northwest and he was recently president of the elected Pilchuck Treasure Hunters Club in Everett, WA. Pat's mom taught him how to cook when he was about 9 years old, and that love of cooking brought him to his chosen profession and much enjoyment into retirement.

Now he and his granddaughter cook together all the time and they especially love to bake goodies.

When Pat looks back on his life, he reflects, "My military service was a defining point in my life and much more important than I ever realized at the time. I am especially proud to be a Seabee, a part of Seabee history, and especially proud to be associated with my Seabee brothers and sisters, and Seabee families past and present."

ON 11 FEBRUARY 2023, PETTY OFFICER GEORGE DEMONSTRATED EXCEPTIONAL GALLANTRY WHEN SHE INSTANTLY SPRANG TO ACTION AFTER RECEIVING A CALL FROM AN UNKNOWN NUMBER ABOUT A POSSIBLE SUICIDE ATTEMPT IN THE BARRACKS. Navy Seabee Jessica Smith's Artwork Recalls U.S. Navy History

Camp Lemonnier's quarterdeck is getting a makeover, thanks to U.S. Navy Builder 2nd Class Jessica Smith, a performance assessment representative for CLDJ's Public Works Department.

For three months, Smith has spent her free time painting a set of murals on the front of the quarterdeck counter. The murals depict vintage WWII posters, including recruiting ads for the Seabees, Rosie the Riveter and scenes of ships in port.

Chief Logistics Specialist Kurt Zabel-Grell approached Smith about painting the Navy quarterdeck after he saw her artwork on her phone.

"I knew she was going to do an amazing job with this project," said Zabel-Grell, who pushed her ideas up to the installation commander for approval. Smith describes her artistic process as peaceful; painting allows her to go into her own world at the end of a long day.

"I'm happy the Navy lets me utilize my passion, even on a deployment," Smith said.

When she's not painting, Smith uses her spare time at CLDJ to finish her master's degree in early childhood education with the help of Navy tuition assistance. She wants to be an art teacher.

"If I can continue to paint and work with kids for the rest of my life, I'd be a happy camper," said Smith.

Camp Lemonnier is an operational installation that enables U.S., allied and partner nation forces to be where they are needed to ensure security and protect U.S. interests. The installation provides worldclass support for service members. transient U.S. assets and 38 local tenant commands, including CJTF-HOA.


Wounded Heroes and Caregivers: Together with our partners, we continue to serve this community through care package deliveries as well as community-building events.



Information from a YouTube video, Veteran William A. Caparella enlisted in the Navy shortly after the beginning of WWII. Because of his experience in construction, he was recruited for the Naval Construction Battalion, better known as Seabees. He was stationed in the Aleutian Islands, Ulithi Atoll, and Okinawa. Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association and CEC/Seabee Historical Foundation become Navy Seabee Foundation

On December 2nd, 2023, the boards of the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association and the CEC/Seabee Historical Foundation signed an agreement to merge the two organizations and become the Navy Seabee Foundation. The agreement will take effect on December 31st, 2023. This was the culmination of nearly two years of research, discussion and negotiations.

The purpose of the Navy Seabee Foundation is the preservation and protection of the history and heritage of the U.S. Navy Seabees and the U.S. Navy Civil Engineer Corps; the awarding of scholarships to deserving family members of Seabees, CEC Officers, and all who served with the Naval Construction force; supporting the U.S. Navy Seabee Museum, monuments, memorials, and other heritage sites dedicated to the U.S. Navy Seabees; and supporting current and former members of the Seabee/CEC Community and their families.

The board of directors of the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association and the board of trustees of the CEC/ Seabee Historical Foundation will merge to lead the Navy Seabee Foundation. RADM Kevin Slates, CEC, USN, Ret and RDML Lou Cariello, CEC, USN, Ret. will serve as chair and vice chair respectively and the new position of Vice Chair, Senior Enlisted Leader will be filled by CMDCM Doug Heiner, USN, Ret. Dan Miller, currently Executive Director of both organizations will continue as Executive Director. The Navy Seabee Foundation will be headquartered in Springfield, Virginia and have an office at the Seabee Heritage Center in Gulfport Mississippi.

From Kevin Slates, "I am thrilled about the combination of the Seabee Historical Foundation and the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association into a single Seabee nonprofit, and the opportunities it will bring to allow us to better support Seabees and their families. 
