Seabee Celebration...Back Where it All Began

Each year, the Seabee Historical Foundation (SHF) and Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA) hold a Seabee Celebration to recognize outstanding Seabees and Seabee supporters. On September 23, the celebration took place at the Seabee Museum & Memorial Park (SMMP) in Davisville, Rhode Island, where the Seabees began. The event sponsors included Involve, ESPN, Blue Trident, Salem FIVE, and Commodore Builders.

We are deeply grateful to the SMMP team, including individuals like Joe Frigon, SMMP President, Tom Santos, SMMP VP, Jack Sprengel, SMMP Curator, and Dave Spears, SMMP Member, for their support. This dedicated group of Seabees and their "Can Do" volunteers have regularly organized



working parties to upgrade, operate, and maintain the Museum grounds.

Representing SMSA, Lou Cariello, the Chairman of the Board, presented three awards. The Can-Do Award, typically given to a corporation, foundation, or organization embodying the Seabee "CAN DO" Spirit, was presented to the Francis T. & Louise T. Nichols Foundation, which had generously supported SMSA since 2010. This foundation's contributions have exceeded \$250,000 over the years, benefiting students in the Northeast. Francis and Louise Nichols, parents of EOC William Thayer Nichols, a dedicated Seabee in the Naval Reserve, were instrumental in supporting the Scholarship Program.



In 2023, the Seabee Historical Foundation (SHF) achieved unprecedented milestones, thanks to donors and Seabee supporters. A remarkable \$105,000 was directed to the U.S. Navy Seabee Museum, the highest annual contribution since its establishment. This funding significantly backed the success of the "Read with a Seabee" children's program, STEM initiatives for local school children, internet services for Museum visitors, and the meticulous restoration of a stained-glass window from the original base chapel in Davisville, RI, now on display.

Collaborating with the Navy History and Heritage Command, a comprehensive exhibit plan is underway, with efforts to fund the first gallery of exhibits for OEF/OIF. Additionally, SHF continued its support for the Seabee Museum and Memorial Park in Davisville, contributing to the renovation of the recently reopened Chapel in the Pines for the second consecutive year.

For the first time, financial aid was extended to each Seabee Family Readiness Group, enhancing support for families during deployments and in homeport. The success of this program underscores its significance and the intent to sustain it.

SHF facilitated 21 OktoBEEfest events globally, bringing together over 1200 attendees, and the Seabee Celebration event, marking the Seabees' 81st Birthday, drew over 150 guests, including two WWII Seabees, at the Davisville, Rhode Island Seabee Museum and Memorial Park.

The boards of the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association and the Seabee Historical Foundation will vote at our December board meetings to merge into a single organization becoming the Navy Seabee Foundation. I'm excited about this opportunity to better serve the Seabee community and their families (past, present, and future). Thank you for your continuing support. Ooh-rah!

As we bid farewell to 2023, there's much to share and celebrate. This year stands as a record-breaker for scholarship awards, with an impressive \$564,300 granted for the 2023-24 academic year. This brings our cumulative scholarship awards to an astounding \$7.5 million since our inception in 1972, a testament to the unwavering support of donors like yourself.

Currently, we are privileged to support 190 scholarship recipients, each with a unique story encapsulating their dreams, ambitions, and the transformative impact a Seabee scholarship can have on their lives, as illuminated in their compelling applications.

Beyond the realm of scholarships, our focus this year extended to fostering camaraderie among Seabees through various events. This year's celebration was particularly special, featuring the attendance of two WWII-era Seabees. Noteworthy awards were presented, including the "Everyday Hero Award" to SW1 Cayla N. George, the "Distinguished Scholar Award" to Courtney Santos, and the "SMSA Can Do Award" to the Francis T. & Louise T. Nichols Foundation.

On the horizon, the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA) and Seabee Historical Foundation (SHF) are progressing toward a merger. The upcoming December 2nd board meeting marks the final vote on merging these entities into the Navy Seabee Foundation, a strategic move aimed at better serving the Seabee Community. With anticipation, we look forward to the promises and possibilities that 2024 holds.

The SMSA Distinguished Scholar for 2023 was Courtney Santos, who had earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a master's degree in moderate disabilities from Bridgewater State University. She also held a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies in Autism Spectrum Disorders from Arizona State University. Courtney was in her fifth year as a Special Education Teacher at the elementary level, expressing her passion for teaching and witnessing her students' growth.

Courtney's Seabee Sponsor was CM3 Tom Santos, SMMP Vice President, and SHF Board of Trustees. The SMSA Everyday Hero Award recognized Seabees who demonstrated outstanding performance beyond their regular duties. In 2023, the award was presented to SW1 Cayla N. George from NAVFAC EURAFCENT PWD Sigonella, Italy, for her exceptional bravery in saving a fellow sailor's life during a potential suicide attempt.

SW1 George couldn't attend the event but was presented with her award in person in November when she returned to Gulfport MS from her duties in Sigonella.

The SHF, represented by Kevin Slates, the Chairman of the Board, presented three awards, including the Montoya Award, given to Rear Admiral Robert (Bob) M. Gallen, a long-term supporter of the Foundation. Bob, a former trustee on the Board, was unfortunately recovering from surgery, and his brother, CAPT John Gallen, accepted the award on his behalf.

The Fighting Seabee Award went to CM1 Rodney H. Paris from Naval Special Warfare Group ONE, who had made outstanding contributions to mission operations, life support, and infrastructure upgrades

in support of missions in the Arabian Peninsula. CM1 Paris's achievements greatly enhanced the security and response time for forward-deployed forces.

The RADM Lewis B. Combs Award, presented to the individual who contributed significantly to perpetuating the legacy of the Seabees and the Civil Engineer Corps, was awarded to LT Kody Price, an Ocean Engineering Graduate Student at the University of Rhode Island. LT Price's exceptional leadership and dedication were evident during his command of India Company and detail Tinian for NMCB FOUR, where he led various training programs and infrastructure improvement projects, leaving a lasting legacy for the Seabees and the Civil Engineer Corps.




























SMSA CAN DO AWARD

Seabees Construct Facility as Part of Innovative Readiness Training Program

BOSWELL PA (Nov. 15, 2023) - Seabees assigned to Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit (CBMU) 202 partnered with the Air Force's 436th Civil Engineering Squadron in September and November to construct a cabin in Boswell, Pennsylvania for a local outdoor leadership non-profit organization, Outdoor Odyssey, as part of the Department of Defense's innovative readiness training (IRT) program.

The IRT program delivers hands-on training opportunities to military units to increase their deployment readiness while providing key services, like construction capabilities, to American communities. CBMU 202 began working on the cabin project in August and completed their participation this week. The construction project offered not only leadership opportunities to the Seabees but also helped refine their mission essential skills in a new environment.

The project required the skillsets of almost every Seabee rating to include builders, construction electricians, engineering aides, equipment operators and construction mechanics.

Engineering aids refined the layout of the building and surveyed the land while equipment operators and mechanics operated heavy machinery to excavate and grade the surrounding area so that the construction could begin. The builders used their skills of rough and finish framing, roofing, siding and finish carpentry, and the electricians wired the building from start to finish which includes both indoor and outdoor lights and outlets.

"Our Seabees were able to sharpen their skills for their specific rates, but this program has also given the crew the opportunity to teach and learn outside of their expertise so that each individual Seabee could broaden their skill set and strengthen the team," said Builder 2nd Class Agnes Neal, a Seabee who participated in the project.

Outdoor Odyssey was founded in 1998 by retired United States Marine Corps Maj. Gen. T.S. Jones, with the primary mission to pair western Pennsylvania youth with a mentor to build





leadership skills, resiliency and teams. The program has since evolved and expanded to embrace a variety of organizations, including veterans, active duty, and the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps.

"I'm extremely proud of our team and their desire to better themselves through real-world construction tasking but also to contribute towards improving local communities through our service," said Lt. Ensz, executive officer, CBMU 202. "We train to conduct missions where military construction and advanced general engineering support are needed in response to global contingencies, and this project gave us an opportunity to improve our readiness in an isolated location while building partnerships in our communities—that's a win-win scenario for all involved."

CBMU 202, is a subordinate command to Navy Expeditionary Combat Command, who mans, trains, equips, organizes and sustains their forces to bridge the gap from sea to shore and provide expeditionary capabilities in remote, complex and austere environments.

Reliving the WWII Seabee "Can Do!" Spirit

The annual Mid Atlantic Air Museum's "WWII Weekend" in Reading, PA, stands as the largest U.S. living history event dedicated to World War II. Now in its 32nd year, the event showcases over 1500 reenactors, 200 WWII vehicles, and 60 WWII aircraft, drawing an average of 30,000 attendees each year.

Among the participating reenactment groups, the "4th Naval Construction Battalion" is a longstanding and integral part. Founded by Tom Oehme, a former







Seabee, the group accurately portrays a Pacific Island Seabee encampment. With members possessing practical skills as equipment operators, mechanics, and welders, they often assist other reenactment groups with fabrication and repairs in the field.



The group engages and educates show visitors, many of whom are unfamiliar with the Seabees and their history. Through speaking, demonstrating, and exhibiting, they offer insights into the Seabees' mission. The group's display includes vintage WWII construction vehicles used for airfield and building construction, such as a 1944 D7 Bulldozer and a 1943 Caterpillar 2-12 Grader. Visitors can also enjoy hands-on experiences, climbing and sitting on some vehicles under supervision.

The 4th Naval Construction Battalion reenactment group provides an authentic representation of Seabee duties from WWII to the present, serving as an inspiration, particularly to veterans, embodying the "Can Do!" spirit. SMSA Awards 54 Scholarships to Class of '27

After an extensive evaluation process, SMSA awarded 54 scholarships to incoming freshmen in June. They are the daughters, sons and grandchildren of Seabees and CEC officers who have or are currently serving around the world.

The class of 2026 hail from twenty-eight states and will attend two-year, four-year, community or career technical institutions. Their majors include accounting, engineering, business and nursing. In addition to the freshmen, we have renewed 104 upper class scholarships. Through the generosity of our donors, we are pleased to award 161 scholarships this year valued at \$497,000. Awards range from \$1,100 to \$5,300 and can be applied to tuition, housing, textbooks and academic related fees. We are well on our way to reaching our goal of awarding over 200 scholarships a year by 2025.

Have You Made Your Year-end Charitable Giving Plans?

It's a hectic time of year, but you need to make sure you have made your year-end charitable giving plans to take maximum advantage of any tax benefits you might receive. Here are some ways you might be able to save some money and help the charitable organizations of your choice.

Donating Appreciated Stock - With the rapidly changing economy and changes in the deductibility of cash gifts, donating appreciated stock may be a great strategy for some donors. When you purchase stock and hold it for years it may go up significantly in value. This is good for your investment, but when you sell the stock, you may be liable for taxes on the difference of what you paid and what the stock is worth now. If this is the case, donating the stock to a 501c3 charity may be a good strategy for you. By donating the stock at its current value, you may be able to deduct the full value without having to pay taxes on the growth. Of course, consult your tax advisor or attorney before making any large donation to see if it will benefit you and your unique situation.

Donating appreciated stock to the SMSA or SHF is easy. Do not sell it yourself, simply have your broker transfer it directly to our brokerage account and we will handle the sale and provide you with a letter stating the value of your donation.

Donating directly from your IRA - This could satisfy your yearly required minimum distribution (RMD.) IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions are excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes on your IRS Form 1040. The gift counts toward your required minimum distribution for the year in which you made the gift. You could avoid a higher tax bracket that might otherwise result from adding an RMD to your income.

To qualify, you must be 70 ½ or older at the time of the gift. Distributions must be made directly from a traditional IRA account by your IRA administrator and gifts must be outright, meaning they go directly to a charity like the SMSA or SHF.


